

As of 8 July, globally: Over 11.6 million cases and 539,906 deaths

Description of current partnership

IFMSA-IRAQ International Federation of Medical Students' Associations-Iraq

Project Objectives: WASH contribution to COVID-19 prevention and response in vulnerable health care facilities.

Achievements:

- 1,412,525 individuals reached on social media through dissemination of critical key messages;
- Pre KAP survey collected and conduction of awareness campaigns in 40 HCFs;
- 24,088 individuals (40% female) reached with essential WASH supplies;
- 100 medical undergraduates reached through online sessions on IPC;
- 250 peers reached through 3 webinars on COVID-19.

Activities:

- Conduction of Pre and post-KAP surveys;
- Distribution of critical WASH supplies;
- Dissemination of critical key messages on social media (Facebook and Instagram).

Budget: UNICEF contribution (Cash and Supplies): 61,500\$ IFMSA contribution: 2,000\$







What work well and why?

- Harmonization in the intervention in IFMSA teams (3 teams in each of the four governerates).
- Accessibility: Despite the lock down and movement restrictions.
- Virtual training: 100 and 250 individuals engaged in three webinars.
- **Gender equity** in IFMSA (females around 67%)













What could work better, How?

- Scalabilty: Replicate digital/social media to promote the level of awareness among community and disseminate critical key messages at Instagram and Facebook;
- **Promote** school children on IPC through virtual learning;
- Engagement of adolescent and youth people in more virtual training sessions and webinars on Infection, Prevention and Control (IPC) and;
- **Distribution of critical hygiene supplies** to cover the most affected and neglected community with COVID pandemic.



Our experience in Zimbabwe



COVID-19 IN ZIMBABWE

- Multi-layered complex crisis existing pre-COVID-19
- First confirmed case reported March 20th; preparation began March 1st.
- UNICEF and Oxfam have a strong partnership in Zimbabwe
 - Additional funding for COVID-19 response
 in Chipinge





COVID-19 IN ZIMBABWE: HYGIENE PROMOTION AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

- Radio Sessions handwashing, wearing a facemask, water sources and treatment options – streamed on Facebook
- Handwashing stations at water points and schools
- Distribution of hygiene materials to 4814 families; waivers with suppliers





WATER SUPPLY

- Water trucking to quarantine centres and suburbs
- Support to Harare Water and Environmental Health Department with HTH
- Water quality testing





LESSONS LEARNT

- Early planning supported rapid response
- Regular tailoring of activities in reaction to changes and community feedback
- The role of local partners and development actors in supporting response
